

How to Transform Your Mind to Change Behavior

Have you ever wondered why you do the same thing over and over again when it causes you pain or frustration? I have asked this question for years because I used to struggle eating foods that I would regret, but then do it again.

I had all the "knowledge" about food and nutrition, but I still couldn't stop eating unhealthy food. Many years ago, I started to search in the Bible for answers to this and I found scriptures that talk about being transformed by the renewing of your mind. That word transformed means metamorphosis, like when a caterpillar goes into a cocoon and comes out a butterfly. There is a transformation that takes place to cause it to change.

In order for our minds to be renewed and to think differently so we transform, it tells us to renew our minds. That word renew means renovation, like renovating a kitchen. You have to write up plans for the new design, gut out the old design, and install the new kitchen. So, when it comes to our mind, we have to recognize our old ways of thinking, come up with a new plan, and put in the new ways of thinking.

That word, renew, also means with repetition, intensity, and reversal, which makes sense because our behavior is not just changed when we think about it once. We have to work on it with repetition and intensity and have to reverse our old ways of thinking.

For example, if your old ways of thinking have told you it doesn't matter if you go to a restaurant and eat fried food loaded with excess carbs, fat, and calories, and when you eat it, you feel gross and bloated. And you realize you just consumed over 2,500 calories in 10 minutes, of course that is going to affect your weight loss goals and your health. So how do you change that behavior?

You renew your mind with new ways of thinking and realize, yes it does matter if I do that. I had to admit to myself that I always felt gross and regretted it when I was done eating unhealthy foods, so why would I continue to do that to my body!? I had to come up with a new plan for food in those situations. So, I would think about in advance of what I was going to order instead and have a new plan.

It took practice and no, it wasn't easy at first, but with repetition, intensity, and reversing those old thoughts, I was able to totally change my thinking and transform my relationship with food. And instead of food pushing me around and feeling like I had to eat what was tempting me, I became in control of my food choices.

On Saturday, May 15, the Lighthouse for the Visually Impaired and Blind held its 2021 Prom. Each year, the Lighthouse hosts a prom for teens with visual impairment or blindness, however Saturday's event was extra special since the prom was cancelled in 2020 because of the pandemic. Stefanie Pontlitz, Lighthouse CEO said: "It was such a joy to watch our youth at the 2021 Prom. They are just normal teens who love music, dancing and friends. To see them

in an environment where they feel confident and safe and can enjoy Prom the way it was meant to be enjoyed, you can't help but leave with a huge smile on your face."

The teens gathered at the New Port Richey Lighthouse before the prom to prepare—volunteers from local businesses and the community helped them with hair, nails, and attire. Then the teens rode in a party bus as a way to kick off the festivities which also included a lot of dancing, reconnecting, and the coronation of our 2021 Prom King and Queen presented by King Pithla Paul Friedlander and Queen Chasco Lisa Shippy-Gonzalez.

There were several touching moments during the night which included the group being cheered onto the party bus, teens dancing with joy, and a new teen becoming "one of us" as he was led to the dance floor by his new group of peers.

Lighthouse holds an annual prom for teens who are visually impaired or blind so they can experience an event tailored to their needs with all their Lighthouse friends. Lighthouse offers year-round programs for teens that are focused on the development of skills needed for a successful transition to higher education, employment, and living independently. At the start of the pandemic, Lighthouse served the teens through Zoom video chats, conference calls, and supplemented training by dropping off educational materials. Then we added in-person services. Each summer teens are provided an in-person summer camp where they learn various work skills in the community and are taught the skills they need to gain competitive employment.

Preventing and Treating COVID-19 in Children and Teens

We are well aware that adults can contract COVID-19, but, unfortunately, children and teens are also susceptible. However, there are certain precautions we can take to reduce the chance of becoming ill with COVID-19 or the flu.

Wash your hands often, avoid touching your face, limit exposure to people outside the home, and wear masks.

Hand washing should last for 20 seconds. Try to make it fun with your child by singing his or her favorite song while hand washing.

Encourage your child or teen to practice social distancing. Limit the people they are exposed to whenever possible. If you can leave them at home with a family member while you go to the store, then do so. If they must go out in public, they should wear a cloth mask and use hand sanitizer often.

Clean and disinfect your home, especially toys, doorknobs, tables, light switches, television remote controls, and, of course, bathrooms.

As in flu prevention, eating a healthy, well-balanced meal, getting enough sleep as well as plenty of outdoor exercise in the fresh air and sunshine, can help to build your immune system to fight off the illnesses.

If you suspect your child has been exposed to COVID-19, the symptoms can include fever, cough, nasal congestion or runny nose, sore throat, shortness of breath, fatigue, headache, muscle aches, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea, poor appetite, new loss of taste or smell, or belly pain.

The History of Flag Day

The Fourth of July was traditionally celebrated as America's birthday, but the idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the Flag is believed to have first originated in 1885. BJ Cigrand, a schoolteacher, arranged for the pupils in the Fredonia, Wisconsin Public School, District 6, to observe June 14 (the 108th anniversary of the official adoption of The Stars and Stripes) as 'Flag Birthday'.

In numerous magazines and newspaper articles and public addresses over the following years, Cigrand continued to enthusiastically advocate the observance of June 14 as 'Flag Birthday', or 'Flag Day'.

Following the suggestion of Colonel J Granville Leach (at the time historian of the Pennsylvania Society of the Sons of the Revolution), the Pennsylvania Society of Colonial Dames of America on April 25, 1893 adopted a resolution requesting the mayor of Philadelphia and all others in authority and all private citizens to display the Flag on June 14th.

Leach went on to recommend that thereafter the day be known as 'Flag Day', and on that day, school children be assembled for appropriate exercises, with each child being given a small Flag.

In 1894, the governor of New York directed that on June 14 the Flag be displayed on all public buildings. With BJ Cigrand and Leroy Van Horn as the moving spirits, the Illinois organization, known as the American Flag Day Association, was organized for the purpose of promoting the holding of Flag Day exercises.

On June 14th, 1894, under the auspices of this association, the first general public school

children's celebration of Flag Day in Chicago was held in Douglas, Garfield, Humboldt, Lincoln, and Washington Parks, with more than 300,000 children participating.

Inspired by these three decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day - the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 - was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30th, 1916.

While Flag Day was celebrated in various



communities for years after Wilson's proclamation, it was not until August 3rd, 1949, that President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th of each year as National Flag Day.

How to Observe Flag Day

The week of June 14 is designated as "National Flag Week." During National Flag Week, the president will issue a proclamation urging U.S. citizens to fly the American flag for the duration of that week. The flag should also be displayed on all Government buildings. Some organizations hold parades and events in celebration of our national flag and everything it represents. It's also a time to remember and honor military men and women who defend our flag and our country.

United We Stand Divided We Fall

Patrick Henry used the phrase in his last public speech, given in March 1799, in which he denounced The Kentucky and Virginia Resolutions. Clasping his hands and swaying unsteadily, Henry declaimed, "Let us trust God, and our better judgment to set us right hereafter. United we stand, divided we fall. Let us not split into factions which must destroy that union upon which our existence hangs." At the end of his oration, Henry fell into the arms of bystanders and was carried almost lifeless into a nearby tavern. Two months afterward, he had died.


The phrase also appears in the New Testament, albeit in slightly different language. Mark 3:25, "A house divided against itself cannot stand"

Pasco Tax Collector's Offices Collecting Suitcases for "Luggage of Love"



Pasco County Tax Collector Mike Fasano and staff collect donations of "gently-used" luggage, suitcases, and other travel-related bags throughout the year. The items are used to equip displaced children and families with new and/ or "gently-used" suitcases. The kids and families in need are identified by the Luggage of Love program, which is coordinated in Pasco County by the University of Florida's Pasco Extension Office. The children, who often must travel with caseworkers into foster care, or are otherwise removed from their homes due to emergency situations, historically have only had plastic garbage bags

in which to carry their clothing and personal belongings. The luggage adds a level of dignity to a child who is most likely experiencing one of the most traumatic events in their young life (i.e. being removed from their home). In other cases single mothers, often escaping domestic violence, are the recipients of the luggage for themselves and their children.

The staff of the Pasco County Tax Collector's Office continue to respond to the call for help. Staff and members of the public periodically drop off suitcases and other bags which are subsequently delivered to the Luggage of Love program. Right now, the supply of suitable cases is low, and the demand continues to grow.

"Thank you so very much for the donations we have received in the past," comments Elizabeth Urquiola, Program Coordinator for the UF Pasco Extension Office & the Luggage of Love program. "We can't thank our community enough for the amazing generosity. We need to keep our closets full because children and mothers may be in need at any time. 





The Great Florida Outdoors: The Florida Cactus

Dr. Robert Norman, Clinical Professor, Dermatology, Nova Southeastern University

When I found a good spot for an office next to Sickles High School, the owner had several rather old cacti on the property. I really did not want to get rid of them, but the owner's house needed to be knocked down and the office building would take up much of the property. I always have a fond memory of those old creatures, and I enjoy finding them when I am out exploring. Recently I was biking on the path between Alonso High School and the bypass canal when I spotted this magnificent specimen:



According to the UF/IFAS website, the Prickly Pear Cactus (Opuntia humifusa) is native to the U.S., Mexico, and South America, and grows well in many parts of the world. This plant is a member of the genus Opuntia which includes a number of species. The pads are rapidly-growing flattened stems that are elliptical or oblong shaped and range in size (generally between 4 and 18 inches long) depending on the species. The plant has smooth skin that can be bright green to blue-gray in color and some species have spines. Depending on

the species and variety, Opuntia spp. flowers come in a range of warm-hued colors like orange, yellow, red, and pink.

The prickly pear is drought and salt tolerant and has few pest or disease problems. It can grow in the sandiest, well-drained soils and thrives in full sun.

The plants are a diversified food source. Both the pads (cladode, nopales) and the fruits (sometimes called tunas) are edible. Parts of the cactus can be used for everything from main dishes, vegetable sides, breads and desserts, beverages, cocktails, candies, and more. Pads are best eaten when they are young and tender and are said to taste a bit like green beans. The fruit flavor depends on the particular variety and has been compared to strawberries, watermelons, honeydew melons, figs, bananas, or citrus. Prickly pear fruits can be eaten raw or prepared for jams or preserves, jellies, and candies and are delicious at room temperature or chilled.

Six to nine prickly pear species are native to Florida. One prickly pear species is the devil's tongue. It grows 18-36 inches tall and looks like a collection of teardrop-shaped flat pads stacked vertically. The green, sometimes-purple, spiny pads produce yellow flowers and red or pink berries on their edges. This cactus spreads outwardly over the beach or the ground (source OGM newsletter).

The Opuntia ficus-indica species is a Florida cactus that can grow up to 16 feet tall. The Opuntia stricta species is only found in Florida and the tropics.

Another Florida native is the dildo cactus (yes, that's the actual name). Its shape is like a long,

narrow column. According to the National Park Service, this cactus can grow over 20 feet tall. It produces white flowers that are only open at night as well as shiny, red fruit.

Two species of endangered cactus grow in south Florida. The first, called Simpson's apple cactus, produces fragrant, night-blooming flowers pollinated by bats, moths, and other insects that are active at night. This cactus is also called "Queen of the Night." The second endangered cactus is the mistletoe cactus. The last known mistletoe cactus grew in the Everglades but was destroyed by a hurricane in 2005, according to the National Park Service.

How do you tell the age of a cactus? A myth is that you can tell the age of a cactus by the number of its arms. Most articles I read noted that to get an estimate of its age, you should always measure the main body of the cactus plant from its tallest point. It may take up to 10 years for a cactus to grow just 1 inch.

Why do saguaro cacti grow arms? Because saguaros grow so slowly, it might take 50 to 75 years for them to grow their first arms. Arms are important to them because they store extra water. After 100 years, they usually have several arms and after 200 years they have many arms. The iconic saguaro cactus that is typically seen in the Sonoran Desert of the American West can grow to be quite tall. In fact, the tallest of this type of cactus grew to be 78 feet tall. The cactus in the picture may have been alive long before Alonso High School or Westchase or Town n' Country were created.



The Origins of Father's Day & the Fairmont Mining Disaster at Darr Mine

The campaign to celebrate the nation's fathers did not meet with the same enthusiasm perhaps because, as one florist explained, "fathers haven't the same sentimental ap-

peal that mothers have." On July 5, 1908, a West Virginia church sponsored the nation's first event explicitly in honor of fathers, a Sunday sermon in memory of the 362 men who had died in the previous December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah, but it was a one-time commemoration and not an annual holiday. The next year, a Spokane, Washington woman named Sonora Smart Dodd, one of six children raised by a widower, tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents.

She went to local churches, the YMCA, shopkeepers and government officials to drum up support for her idea, and she was successful: Washington State celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on July 19, 1910.

Slowly, the holiday spread. In 1916, President Wilson honored the day by using telegraph signals to unfurl a flag in Spokane when he pressed a button in Washington, D.C. In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge urged state governments to observe Father's Day.

However, many men continued to disdain the day. As one historian writes, they "scoffed at the holiday's sentimental attempts to domesticate manliness with flowers and gift-giving, or they derided the proliferation of such holidays as a commercial gimmick to sell more products--often paid for by the father himself."

During the 1920s and 1930s, a movement arose to scrap Mother's Day and Father's Day altogether in favor of a single holiday, Parents' Day. Every year on Mother's Day, pro-Parents' Day groups rallied in New York City's Central Park--a public reminder, said Parents' Day activist and radio performer Robert Spere, "that both parents should be loved and respected together."

Paradoxically, however, the Depression derailed this effort to combine and de-commercialize the holidays. Struggling retailers and advertisers redoubled their efforts to make Father's Day a "second Christmas" for men, promoting goods such as neckties, hats, socks, pipes and tobacco, golf clubs and other sporting goods, and greeting cards.

When World War II began, advertisers began to argue that celebrating Father's Day was a way to honor American troops and support the war effort. By the end of the war, Father's Day may not have been a federal holiday, but it was a national institution.

In 1972, in the middle of a hard-fought presidential re-election campaign, Richard Nixon signed a proclamation making Father's Day a federal holiday at last. Today, economists estimate that Americans spend more than \$1

because we can imagine the conversations he more than what we said. had with Mary, and the Angel Gabriel. We can "hear" him talking to the innkeeper. We can visualize him teaching Jesus about carpentry, but then he fades from the scene.

It is widely thought that Joseph was much older than Mary and when Jesus began His ministry, Mary is alone.

Joseph probably thought his life was pretty well planned. His marriage and his vocation were all arranged neatly for him. Then his world came crashing down. He discovered that his bride-to-be was pregnant.

We know that Joseph was a man of integrity. He wanted to do the right thing in the right way. He considered divorcing Mary when he learned of her pregnancy, but wanted to do so without calling attention to the reason. Instead, he risks being questioned about Mary's pregnancy and they marry.

In those days, a marriage contract was worked out between families, and the engaged couple continued to live with their parents until their wedding. Joseph protected their reputation by moving up the wedding date.

The Roman census took them far away from the town's questioning eyes. Although Joseph came from the royal lineage of King David, he was a humble man.

The brief portrait of him in Scripture suggests he was a quiet, unobtrusive man, available when needed, willing to endure hardship and disappointment.

Looking forward to fathering his own child, Joseph was faced with being a stepfather. He trusted God's care every step of the way. He didn't have any parenting books, any training on how to be a father to the Son of God, but he possessed faith and compassion.

Bible scholars portray Joseph as an effective provider and protector of the family. Joseph had the important role of caring for the needs

We might assume his words are recorded of others. People will remember what we did

The late Erma Bombeck wrote these words about her father:

"One morning, my father didn't get up and go to work. He went to the hospital and died the next day. I hadn't thought that much about

He was just someone who left and came home and seemed glad to see everyone at night. He opened the jar of pickles when no one else could. He was the only one in the house who wasn't afraid to go to the basement

He cut himself shaving, but no one kissed it or got excited about it. It was understood when it rained, he got the car and brought it around to the door where we waited. When anyone got sick, he went out to get the prescription filled. He took lots of pictures, but he was never in them.

Whenever I played house, the mother doll had a lot to do. I never knew what to do with the daddy doll, so I had him say, "I'm going to work now," and threw him under the bed.

The funeral was in our living room and a lot of people came and brought all kinds of good food and cakes. We had never had so much company before. I went under my bed to feel for the daddy doll. When I found him, I dusted him off and put him on my bed. He never did anything that I remember. I didn't know his leaving would hurt so much."

Dads, we can either be absent or present. Choose to be present because time goes by so quickly. We can't relive those precious moments with our families.

At 10:20 a.m., December 6, 1907, explosions occurred at the No. 6 and No. 8 mines at Monongah, West Virginia. The explosions ripped through the mines at 10:28 a.m., causing the earth to shake as far as eight miles away, shattering buildings and pavement, hurling people and horses violently to the ground, and knocking streetcars off their rails. Threehundred and sixty-two men and boys died. It remains the worst mine disaster in the history of the United States.



Our Father

Boating Safety



Operations Unit wants to share some important reminders for safe boating. While we encourage everyone to have fun on the water, being safe while on a boat is imperative. Taking a few easy steps before you head out can help save lives and make your day on the boat that much better.

Before heading out on the water, take a safe boating course and get a vessel safety check. These steps en-

sure that not only are you prepared for a fun day on the water, but your boat is as well. You should also know how the environment and weather will affect your day out. Check with the local weather service for a forecast and any active alerts and warnings, especially marine warnings. Never try to test your boating mettle against the weather.

Keep in mind how the heat and vessel motion will affect your abilities. Stay hydrated with plenty of water throughout the day, as heat exhaustion and heat stroke can happen quickly, and you may be far from land when it does. Don't forget to apply and re-apply sunscreen as needed too.

When it comes to drinking on a boat, paddle board, kayak, or any watercraft, ensure you have a designated driver. The motion of the water affects impairment differently than drinking on land, so one drink can feel like three on a boat. Boating While Intoxicated accounts for over a third of all recreational boating fatalities and is easily preventable. Just like driving a car while intoxicated, federal law prohibits boating under the influence of drugs and alcohol.

Before you head out for a day of fun, take time to put together a float plan and leave it with someone on land. A float plan should include where you're going, who is with you, what time you're

The Pasco Sheriff's Office Maritime leaving and plan to return and where you're putting your watercraft in. Leave this information with a family member, friend, neighbor, or other trusted person on land so they can be on the lookout for your return and can alert authorities when you don't. It's also helpful to include information about your watercraft such as color, length, registration number and type, as well as information on the vehicle you used to take your watercraft to the boat ramp.

> Most importantly, don't forget to ensure that every person, regardless of age or swimming abilities, has a functioning life jacket on board and that it can be easily accessed in an emergency. Boat emergencies can happen in a split second and rescue crews may require some time to find you, so having a life jacket readily available is vital to safe boating. Those who are not strong swimmers should wear a life jacket at all times while on the water. Even the strongest swimmers can tire quickly when stressed, so life jackets can be real lifesavers!

Lastly, before you head out for the day, ensure you have the essentials, which, once again, include:

- · Life jackets for everyone on board
- · Visual distress signals, such as flares
- Sound producing devices, like whistles
- A locator device, such as an EPIRB
- A fire extinguisher
- Navigation lights, especially at night
- · Plenty of drinkable water to stay hydrated
- Correct and up-to-date permits, decals and registrations
- A cell phone that's fully charged
- · Filing a float plan before heading out



June Garden Tips

What to Plant

The planting list is short! Okra and Southern Peas from seed. Cherry Tomatoes, Eggplant, & Peppers (from starter plants)

Seeding for Summer Cover Crops, if you're not growing any of the above, is a great idea this month, those include southern peas mentioned above, Sunn Hemp, Marigolds, Buckwheat, fava beans, and more. Build Your Soil!

Our selection of vegetable plants is pretty bare at Shell's - we are getting the occasional annual & perennial flower shipment though! See our Social Media for more details on when those shipments come in (hint, check Fridays!).

What Needs Done

Edibles/Veggies: Fertilize existing veggie plants with a side dressing of fertilizer like Shell's 3-3-3 Organic for great bio-availability & soil enrichment. Add Dolomitic Lime/Ag Lime to your nightshades (tomatoes, peppers, etc) to keep blossom end rot at bay if you didn't last month. Fungus is a problem in Florida! Spray Garden Friendly Fungicide on cucumbers, squash, & melons for fungal diseases & keep the surroundings safe - spray tops & undersides of leaves as directed (see our staff for helpful tips!). Got bugs? Try Triple Action Neem Oil, Conserve Naturalyte, or Natural Pyrethrins, depending on what bugs you've got.

Lawn & Landscape: ATTENTION! THERE IS A FERTILIZER BAN THAT STARTS JUNE 1 FOR USES THAT ARE NOT RELATED TO FOOD PRODUCTION IN CITY OF TAMPA. CHECK YOUR MUNICIPALITY FOR ANY RESTRICTIONS TO PROTECT OUR BAY AND INLAND WATERS!

Treat lawns for insects such as Chinch bugs, mole crickets & fleas with products containing Permethrin or Bifenthrin, OR Cedar Granules & Natural Guard for nonchemical treatment. Re-seed or fill in bare patches in your Bahia lawn by broadcasting Argentine Bahia seed at 1lb/100sqft. Rake it in and/or cover with soil. Water daily - make sure to follow the rules in your municipality! Use Hydretain in all your watering to reduce the amount of water you use by 50%!
